


Developing Leader Profiles . . . People you Need to Know

1. What are your current responsibilities and background?

My current responsibilities include leasing, disposition, and some acquisition work for the Prologis Chicago portfolio. My portfolio is approximately 12 million square feet, which comprises warehouse, distribution, and manufacturing facilities in I-88, Central DuPage, and O'Hare. Prior to joining Prologis I



was a Tenant Representative at JLL. I feel very fortunate to work for two prestigious companies that have enabled me to see the business from both a brokerage and owners perspective. As much as I'm grateful for my real estate career, my favorite job was playing baseball in Israel. In 2007 I was a part of the first and last season of the Israel Baseball League. I still hold the record for worst batting average and fewest fans (it was three, but my grandma recently told me I disappointed her and she's moved on).

2. Who has been the biggest influence in your career so far?
